This emergency authorisation relates to the use of 'Benevia 100D' on outdoor and protected crops of Strawberries for control of spotted wing drosophila (*Drosophila suzukii*).

IMPORTANT: When applying this product under the terms of this emergency authorisation, comply with any resistance guidance or restrictions stated on the product label.

IMPORTANT: Those parties involved in the distribution and sale of goods should note that goods treated under the terms of this authorisation can only be legally marketed in Northern Ireland if they are in accordance with the statutory EU MRL set under Regulation (EC) No 396/2005. Growers are advised to draw this to the attention of distributors and retailers who are customers for their goods so that EU MRL breaches and potential enforcement against goods marketed in Northern Ireland is avoided.

### Restrictions

Please see the Emergency Authorisation notice for obligatory conditions including operator and environmental protections and 'Other specific restrictions. Some relevant restrictions are listed below:

**Dangerous to bees. To protect bees and pollinating insects do not apply to crop plants when in flower. Do not use where bees are actively foraging. Do not apply when flowering weeds are present.**

1. Applications must only be applied for the control of Spotted Wing Drosophila (*Drosophila suzukii*) (SWD) in Great Britain.
2. Product must only be applied in accordance with the terms of this emergency authorisation, the product label and/or leaflet.

3. This product must not be applied via hand-held equipment.
4. Disposal of stocks must occur by the disposal date specified in this notice of authorisation either by return to the manufacturer or via an appropriate means such as a licensed hazardous waste contractor.

## Stewardship

See Appendix 3 of the Emergency Authorisation for the full stewardship document which must be followed as a condition of the authorisation.

Strawberry growers, agronomists are responsible for monitoring pest pressure, recording product use, and submission to HCP for data collation. Data required are:

- Location and areas treated (split by outdoor and protected crops)
- Number and date of sprays used.
- Dates of SWD presence in the crop and evidence from e.g. trap counts and flotation tests, must be provided to justify spray decisions.

Stewardship records are to be available to the Chemicals Regulation Division of HSE on request and at the point of any subsequent application for this emergency use.

## Further Grower Information

Restrictions stipulated on the Article 53 Notice of Authorisation are statutory and therefore must be complied with to permit use of this product on the specified crop. Please read the notice of authorisation in full before applying the product for control of the specified target organism.
